Session Descriptions

From the Marshall Plan to the SDGs - Theory and Practice of Global Development

Over a billion people in the world lack access to safe drinking water, two billion to safe sanitation, and three billion to reliable and safe sources of energy. This session reviews some of the origins of poverty and the current conditions of people in developing countries, and offers some development solutions being pursued around the world.

Markets play an essential role in driving growth and job creation in developing countries and can be a powerful force in reducing poverty and increasing incomes. Planetary Health

Meet Your Plenary Speakers

Martha Newsome, President and CEO, Medical Teams International

Martha holds a Master's degree in Public Health from the Johns Hopkins School of Hygiene and Public Health, where she concentrated her studies in international health with an emphasis on biostatistics and maternal and child health. Martha has spent the last 30 years addressing international health needs including leading World Vision International's Global Sustainable Health team which includes their global programs in food, health and nutrition, and water, sanitation, and hygiene and represents global teams of over 3000 employees and a budget of \$700M. She has lived and worked in Mozambique as a national director and in South Africa where she oversaw World Vision's HIV&AIDS work in 26 African countries.

Margaret Everett, Portland State University Interim Provost and Vice President of Academic Affairs

Margaret Everett is Interim Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs at Portland State University, where she previously served as Dean of Graduate Studies, and Vice Provost for International Affairs. She earned her PhD in Anthropology from Yale University in 1995. Her areas of interest include health policy, health promotion and cultural dimensions of health and healing. Margaret has conducted community based participatory research with Latino communities in Oregon regarding food access and healthy communities. She has published research about diabetes and the nutrition transition in Oaxaca, Mexico. Current research focuses on gender and health seeking among Pentecostals in Mexico. Margaret has served on numerous community boards and committees, including the Healthy Eating Active Living Coalition with the Multnomah County Health Department and the Genetic Research Advisory Committee of Oregon. She currently serves on the board of trustees for the World Affairs Council of Oregon.

Donald E. Moore, Director, Oregon Zoo

Don Moore became director of the Oregon Zoo in February 2016. Prior to joining the Oregon Zoo, Don was a senior scientist at the Smithsonian's National Zoo and has a 40 year history in wildlife conservation, animal welfare and zoo management. Don earned his bachelor's and doctoral degrees in wildlife management and conservation biology from the State University of New York's College of Environmental Science and Forestry, as well as a master's degree in public administration from Syracuse University. He has led international workshops in modern zoo design and accreditation, animal behavior and enrichment, and ecotourism in Spain, Malaysia and South America, where he has conducted much of his conservation biology research.

Andrea Johnson, Executive Director, Green Empowerment

Andrea Johnson combines her experience in international community development, environmental conservation, organizational management and clean energy to advance Green Empowerment's mission and impact. Andrea got her start in international work in Ecuador, where she served as a Peace Corps Volunteer and trainer. She extended her stay to work with the Ceiba Foundation, Conservation International and the Ministry of Environment to implement SocioBosque – a REDD+ program that offers payments to landowners to guarantee its conservation over 20 years. After almost four years living in bamboo hut in coastal Ecuador, Andrea landed in Portland where she worked in the energy industry before joining Green Empowerment in early 2016.

Rick Zenn, Senior Fellow, World Forestry Center

Rick Zenn is an internationally recognized environmental educator with more than 30 years professional experience in the field as a naturalist, teacher, program manager, trainer and consultant. He is the first Senior Fellow at the World Forestry Center, appointed in 2009 after serving as the center's popular education director for nearly 20 years. Today, Rick leads the national and international education and outreach initiatives of the non-profit World Forestry Center focusing on partnerships, training and institutional development. He serves as advisor to the President and CEO, as well as to the director and forest researchers in the center's World Forest Institute (WFI). He is a frequent host for visiting educators, scientists and government leaders from around the world.

Michele Justice, International Programs Director, College of Forestry at Oregon State University

As the Director for International Programs, Michelle Justice is charged with implementing strategic internationalization for Oregon State University's College of Forestry's faculty, students, and external stakeholders. Michele has over twenty years' experience in international education, creating opportunities for both incoming and outgoing students and scholars. Much of her work has focused on program development for students in the STEM fields, and experiential learning through overseas internships. She has worked jointly with faculty to create over 15 faculty-led programs, in locations as diverse as Japan, Malaysian Borneo and Cuba. She studied at the University of California, Davis (B.A., Classics) and University of Oxford, UK (M. Litt., Literae Humaniores in Classical Archaeology and Ancient History). International education has been a lifelong pursuit for her, and her background includes living and working in the Middle East (Yemen, Saudi Arabia and Egypt) and South Asia (India and Pakistan) as well as the UK.

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
